Our new Crucifix



-The cross measures 10' high x 6'9" wide and is fashioned out of white oak. Ken Manning is responsible for the beautiful workmanship.
 - The corpus (the body) was ordered from Italy at a cost of \$16,695.00 and is made from linden wood. Linden wood has been a popular wood for carving since the Middle Ages, because it is considered a soft wood, has very little grain, and has a nice density. Linden is also a popular wood choice for musical instrument makers.

- The corpus of Jesus is 72" or 6ft tall.
- The weight of the cross and corpus is 240 pounds.

-The installation of the crucifix took place over several days and required the erection of 45 feet of scaffolding. Rumor has it our village priest scaled said scaffolding.
 - The total installed cost was covered through the donations of some of our parishioners.
 On December 2nd, Archbishop Smith presided at our new 12:30pm Mass and blessed the crucifix.

Wednesday, December 12

Our Lady of Guadalupe

Mary, lowly and poor herself, showed concern for the poor when she appeared, with brown skin and wearing indigenous robes, to Juan Diego near Mexico City in 1531. She asked him to build a church in her honor. His bishop disbelieved such a story from this poor indigenous man. Three days later, when she told him to ask again, dozens of red roses dropped from his cloak, and the bishop saw the image of Mary imprinted on it. He built the church! Mary gave hope to Mexico's oppressed people, and to this day she is invoked to intercede for the poor and suffering. *Today's Readings: Zechariah 2:14-17; Judith 13:18bcde, 19; Luke 1:39-47.*

Thursday, December 13

St. Lucy

In the Gospel, Jesus sings the praises of John the Baptist, who will soon be martyred at the hands of Herod. Today the Church honors another martyr, St. Lucy, who died in AD 304 during a Roman persecution of Christians. She is said to have brought food to Christians hiding in the catacombs, wearing a wreath of candles to light her way. Lucy means "light," and we remember her during this season of waiting for the Light of the World. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 41:13-20; Psalm 145:1 and 9, 10-11, 12-13ab; Matthew 11:11-15.*

Friday, December 14

St. John of the Cross

The first psalm is a recipe for a happy and fruitful life: "The law of the Lord is their joy; God's law they study day and night." John of the Cross, in sixteenth-century Spain, was called to a life of prayer in a Carmelite monastery. When other friars turned on him and imprisoned him for nine months, he had encounters with God that he described in mystical poems. He spent those days and nights joyfully with nothing to distract him from the love of the Lord. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 48:17-19; Psalm 1:1-2, 3, 4 and 6; Matthew 11:16-19.*

Saturday, December 15

An End to Wrath

Today we hear about the great prophet Elijah. Taken to heaven in a whirlwind, he is to return as a forerunner of the Messiah: "to put an end to wrath before the day of the Lord." Jesus, who has just been transfigured and appeared with Moses and Elijah, explains that John the Baptist has fulfilled the mission of Elijah. Who will prepare the way for the Messiah's return? Who among us helps to turn hearts toward God and each other? *Today's Readings: Sirach 48:1-4, 9-11; Psalm 80:2ac and 3b, 15-16, 18-19; Matthew 17:9a, 10-13.*

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Second Sunday of Advent Sunday, December 9, 2018



The Salvation of our God

Today's Readings: Baruch 5:1-9; Psalm 126:1-2, 2-3, 4-5, 6; Philippians 1:4-6, 8-11; Luke 3:1-6. While kings and priests go about their important work, something is happening in the desert. "The word of God" comes to John, whose birth was surrounded by such marvelous events that people had asked, "What, then, will this child be?" (Luke 1:66). John, the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy, is "a voice . . . crying out in the desert." He has an urgent message for the people of his time: to prepare

the way of the Lord.

The Word of the Lord comes to us, too, when we take a rest from our work and withdraw to a place of silence. Try to spend ten minutes a day this week in silence, opening your heart to Jesus, making straight his paths by removing resentment, bitterness, vengeful thoughts, anger, greed, envy, and anything else that might block his path. His great desire is to enter our hearts with the healing that he alone can bring.

With the path cleared, Jesus will amaze us with what he can do. He will lower mountains and hills in our life that had seemed insurmountable, straighten winding roads that seem to be leading nowhere, and smooth rough ways that are difficult to navigate.

As the love of Christ makes a home in our heart, it will begin to overflow to every person and situation in our life. We will be ready to celebrate Christmas with joy, knowing that it is but a foretaste of the joy we will know when Christ returns "and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

Monday, December 10

Bringing Others to Jesus

As in today's Gospel, people with disabilities sometimes need friends to bring them to Jesus. Does someone need a ride to Mass? Can all people access our church, sanctuary, religious education, and social spaces? Are children and adults with disabilities invited to participate in religious education and liturgical ministries? We must ask these questions if we are to say that "all are welcome." *Today's Readings: Isaiah 35:1-10; Psalm 85:9ab and 10, 11-12, 13-14; Luke 5:17-26.*

Tuesday, December 11

The Good Shepherd's Love

The metaphor of God as Shepherd and us as his sheep dates to the Old Testament. Isaiah compares God to a shepherd who feeds, carries, and leads his flock. In the New Testament, Jesus calls himself the "Good Shepherd." Today's Gospel has an example of how he is "good": when just one of us goes astray, he leaves the others behind to search for that one. God never forgets about us or gives up on us. *Today's Readings: Isaiah 40:1-11; Psalm 96:1-2, 3 and 10ac, 11-12, 13; Matthew 18:12-14.*

Living in the Word of God

'Hear the Word of God and Do It'

Living in the Word To be disciples, to live in accord with our Baptismal identity and dignity, is to allow only his words to guide and direct our lives. Let us take great care to hear only his Word, to turn away from any voice that leads us from him, and to put into practice that which he tells us. Then we shall know the joy of living as his brothers and sisters.

Celebrating Catholic Education

Alberta, Ontario, and Saskatchewan are blessed to have publicly funded Catholic schools. Recent public conversation surrounding Catholic education has provided us with a wonderful opportunity to highlight what makes our Catholic schools special and unique. As you may have heard Catholic education is under examination and we need to highlight and share what makes Catholic Schools special and unique. Some of us have personal stories, some have stories through their children, but we all have Good News stories to share about Catholic education.

Sharing Our Stories

Miss Brandy Laurin - Collaborative Response Coordinator

I feel very lucky to have not only attended Elk Island Catholic Schools (EICS) throughout my Kindergarten through Grade 12 school years, but to also be an educator in this district. Growing up, I had always known I wanted to be a teacher and that I wanted to teach in EICS and felt very privileged to be given this opportunity. All my memories and experiences with Catholic Education revolve around a feeling of being welcomed and loved for who I am. It was really important for me to work in an environment that was focused on the connection we all share with one another and with God. I have a great privilege in not only guiding students through their faith journeys, but also working in a community that supports and guides me in my faith journey. Catholic Education has made a huge impact on my life as a student and educator, and my hope is that I am able to share that with the students I get to interact with.

What makes our schools Catholic?

Mission... At the heart of catechesis, we find, in essence, a person, the Person of Jesus of Nazareth, "the only son of the Father... full of grace and truth," who suffered and died for us and who now, after rising, is living with us



forever. We must therefore say that, in catechesis, it is Christ, the Incarnate Word and Son of God, who was taught -- everything else is taught with reference to him -- and it is Christ alone, who teaches... (Apostolic Exhortation Catechesis Tradendae, p. 8-10)

Each of us working in Catholic schools is called to be Christ's spokesperson, enabling Him to be present through us! For someone who is new to the Catholic school system, an understandable question is what makes the schools Catholic? There is much that distinguishes Catholic schools, which students and their families can readily observe.

Religion classes, **Prayer services** (liturgies of the word and Mass) at key points in the school year, **Liturgical Calendar**, **Religious symbols**, posters, icons, and art work etc.

School names, that tie into our faith, tradition and understanding. **Prayer** at key times and events - over the intercom or in the classroom, **One-day or overnight retreats** that supplement what is taught in religion classes. **Faith-related professional development days**, which may be district wide or school-based and **Chaplains and chapels** in ALL our schools.

A full-time District Religious Education Consultant.

A well-funded faith formation program for all staff to take courses focused mostly Catholic theology, scripture, and morality.

In addition to the above items are the following critically important dimensions of Catholic schools:

Teachers strive to integrate their faith with their teaching and interactions with everyone.

A faith conviction that each child and person's dignity comes from being created in the image of God, is promoted throughout Catholic schools.

Our school Division's vision statement of "Seeing Christ in Everyone" challenges us to embrace every person as someone of immense worth and potential.

The Biblical values of respect for the common good and justice for all are guiding principles that those working in our schools are encouraged to adopt.

Teachers work towards giving witness to their Christian faith by sharing their faith journeys and leading students in prayer and a life directed to the needs of those who are oppressed or destitute.

God, who we meet most fully in Christ, is proclaimed in word and deed according to the ability of each person working in our division to do so.

Schools actively work at connecting with the parishes by attending Mass at the church and having parish priests visit the schools.

All of our schools examine how they can improve the way they live out and give expression to their Catholic identity.

We see our homes, schools, and parishes as interconnected entities working together to teach, live, and celebrate the good news of Jesus Christ.

The school system, then, needs the children enrolled in our schools and their families to support the Catholic values, beliefs and activities mentioned in this document.

Our publicly funded Catholic schools are an immense treasure: they support our children on their faith journeys and help their families and parishes lead them with and to Christ.
