

Few people could have anticipated the full implications of legalizing euthanasia in Canada. 7 years later, there are growing concerns about the expanding scope of euthanasia, the lack of protections for people experiencing vulnerability, and the long-term effects on the ethics of the medical system. As disturbing as these developments are, they point to a larger problem – a national crisis of meaning. Only faith provides an antidote to this cultural malaise. In this presentation, Deacon Larry Worthen will explain the recent evolution of euthanasia policy in Canada and its impact on human dignity. He will describe the role that churches can play in restoring the perceived value of every human life. Hope & Dignity

Many of us have had the experience of accompanying a loved one who is ill and is residing in a care facility within the medical system. Whether a hospital or an extended care center, many of us of a certain age, have walked the halls of these facilities to visit a loved one. To make this scenario more vivid, think about your aging parent, an elderly aunt or uncle, or a close friend. Our health care system, and the care it provides, becomes a whole lot more poignant when it is our loved one who is being cared for.

So imagine we are the primary caregiver for a loved one who is in hospital or an acute extended care center. Our loved one has been experiencing discomfort over an extended period and it is not easy for us to watch them in their time of frustration and pain. One day out of frustration they say to you, "I just want to end this. I want this to be over." You are in a non-Catholic health care setting and the doctors and nurses have also heard your loved one's frustration. They present to you and your loved one some options:

- 1. Care that would mitigate pain and offer what we refer to as "comfort care."
- 2. If there is what is termed "heroic treatment" being administered (meaning a very advanced form of supporting the life of your loved one), this could be stopped, and with quality comfort care and pain mediation in place, nature could take its course.
- 3. Or we could just administer a needle that will end all pain by ending your beloved's life. (ie: MAiD Medical Assistance in Dying.)

When "MAiD" (ie: euthanasia) became law in Canada in June 2016 it did two things: It allowed people with a serious non-reversable illness to choose to make a voluntary request for assistance in dying, and it changed Canada's criminal code to exempt the doctors and nurses who provide or help to provide it. To be eligible for MAiD, one must have a serious illness in an advanced state of decline, which cannot be relieved under conditions that are considered acceptable. It does not need to be a terminal condition to qualify for MAiD. What are we actually saying within these statements from Health Canada? Our loved one can choose to end their life; either by having a drug injected into their system that causes death, or by having a drug prescribed that, when taken, will bring about their death. One of the acronyms we use for MAiD is "assisted suicide," because it is.

Needless to say, suicide, never mind assisting another in committing suicide, cannot be considered right. Life is a gift, given to us by God, and our lives here in the world will end when God deems it appropriate. In the meantime, we need to treasure the life we have been given, and live it as fully as we are able. We will encounter friends and family who, be-

cause they are frustrated, discouraged, and tired of their condition, may look at assisted suicide as an avenue of relief. Perhaps this person simply does not want to be a burden to their family, so they see assisted suicide as a possible solution. Note, I am using assisted suicide as a term rather than MAiD. "Medical Assistance in Dying" somehow glamorizes or gives these actions a sense of integrity. There is no integrity in assisting, or being part of ending someone's life. In point of fact, the Catholic Church has been assisting people in dying for two thousand years; in an ethical, prayerful, and spiritual way.

Our health care system has come an extraordinarily long ways in providing dignified and comfortable end stage life care for Canadians. Just because our loved one is debilitated, and unable to do what they used to do, does not negate their dignity as a human person, and therefore as a child of God. Our God loves us not for what we do, but for who we are, His children.

I am going down this road because most of us will at some point walk with a loved one who is elderly, or ill, or otherwise struggling. We need to be able to give them good quality, orthodox, Catholic assistance/counsel/advice. For our own sake, we need to know what is available, what is acceptable, and what is right from a Catholic perspective, that values the dignity of all life. We need to know what is right and what is wrong, for our loved one's sake, and for us who will need to live with decisions made. MAiD is gaining momentum. The mentally ill are the next group that will qualify for MAiD. Where is this going to end my friends? This is unacceptable. We do not get to choose who lives and who dies. It is as simple as that, but MAiD does not see it that way.

This **Thursday February 8, at 7:00 pm here at our OLPH parish** we will have the opportunity to receive a solid, orthodox Catholic perspective on death and dying, presented by Deacon Larry Worthen and Archbishop Richard Smith after our evening Mass. We will learn about the woeful wrongness of MAiD, and of the wonderful loving care that is available to us and our loved ones within the Canadian health care system. **I strongly encourage you to attend this event**, because it will at some point become unbelievably valuable to you, as you walk with your aging parent or other beloved family members. This is far too important a topic not to have a clear understanding of what is right and what is wrong.

God made us, ultimately to spend eternal life with Him in the heavenly kingdom. We do not want to be part of anything that could diminish the absolutely most important outcome of our entire well-lived lives. Please check the front page of this bulletin for more information. Please invite family and friends to attend this critically important event in the life our Church's faithful.




