#### Lest We Forget

I don't know about you, but I tend to take a lot of things for granted. A comfortable bed, enough money to do what I want when I want, the security of my vocation as a Catholic priest. One of the things that I do not think about much, is the reality of my freedom. This great country, where I can come and go as I please; with wide-open spaces in relation to the crowding of other areas of the world.

We will celebrate Remembrance Day this Tuesday. For me, this is one of the most meaning-ful statutory holidays that we celebrate in Canada. Though it should be, freedom is not an absolute. We can look at the regions we pray for daily: Ukraine, Israel and Gaza. Imagine living in a situation where your freedom was intensely limited, because of the fear of physical violence or even death, for being in the wrong place at the wrong time. Life is too short to live daily under those conditions.

The freedom that we celebrate, and that I take too much for granted, is ours for a price paid by others. Those, who when the call came, stood up, and said "I will go, I will serve." I realize that 1914 and 1939 were different times in history, but they were not that long ago, considering the history of humanity. I wonder how things would go today, if the call came to stand and take up arms? I pray that we never need to find out.

As I reflect on what and who we remember on November 11, I think about young dads, sons of parents, who simply knew somehow that it was their duty to stand up and be counted. And that they did. The numbers are staggering in Canada alone, when we consider how many did not make it home from their service to freedom and their country. Between sixty to sixty-five thousand in World War I (Canada's population about eight million), and about forty-five thousand in World War II (population about eleven million). We now have cities in North America with populations larger than Canada's population was during the great wars.

There must have been a tremendous sense of duty in the hearts of the Canadians who served their country during these times, as well as in Korea and in other more recent world conflicts. In my mind, the only thing that would inspire an individual to take up arms and travel thousands of miles to risk their life, was a deep sense of duty, and faith in their Creator. I have a sense that this is the difference between our society approximately one hundred years ago, and the society we live in today. Duty and faith, I believe would have been the hallmarks of the folks in the early days of our great country. Duty and faith, because the vast majority of those living in Canada, who stood to serve, were the sons and daughters of immigrant parents. These pioneers who immigrated to Canada from Europe and other continents, were people who knew that the Lord walked with them on their perilous journeys; often to a country where the language, the culture, and the way of life was completely foreign to them.

I find it challenging to imagine the courage that these early settlers must have brought with

them; often with little more than faith, courage, and the promise of a better life. To come to Alberta with the promise of a quarter section of land, but to have to break that land to make it suitable for a planting a crop, is something amazing to me. The hard work and commitment, literally to survive, is a testament to faith and a response to the call of duty. Those who served in the great wars of the last century, are the sons and daughters of these immigrants, who brought with them faith and courage. I see this as the difference between then and now. One hundred years ago, or so, was a time where survival meant extremely hard work. Now, hard work is important, but actual survival is more or less a given, with or without it.

Our immigrant parents and grandparents came to this country not for their benefit, but so that those they love, their future generations of family, would have better opportunities. And plentiful those opportunities are; as we ride upon the shoulders of those who came before us. The early immigrants settled the land and their children stood to protect the freedom that you and I may tend to take as a matter of fact. Our freedom is only a matter of fact, because those who went before us had a profound respect and love for the land that their parents had settled, at great cost and sacrifice.

This reflection has brought me to a place where I need to spend some time reflecting on the magnitude and the sacrifice our Lord Jesus Christ, for the entirety of humanity. Selfless, profound love; not counting the cost, but doing what needed to be done. Enduring what needed to be endured for the sake of, and love of, humanity.
